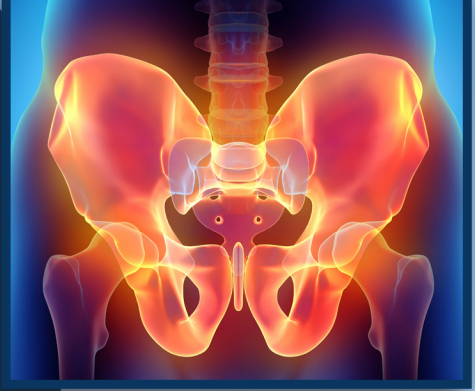

## Welcome

Welcome to the Pelvic Venous Disorders Summit!

Chronic pelvic pain affects nearly 10 million women in the United States, with pelvic venous disease (PeVD) representing a major yet under recognized cause in over half of these patients. Despite frequent interactions with the healthcare system, many patients experience delayed diagnosis, fragmented care, and ineffective treatments-resulting in persistent symptoms and significant societal cost. This summit represents a critical step toward changing that trajectory.

This first-of-its-kind meeting brings together a truly multidisciplinary group of specialists - including vascular surgeons, gynecologists, interventional radiologists, cardiologists, pelvic floor therapists, and sonographers to address PeVD as both a clinical and public health challenge. As reflected in the program, discussions will span the full spectrum of disease, from patient-centered perspectives and health system barriers to foundational concepts in pathophysiology, imaging, and classification, and into nuanced management strategies across S1-S3 disease states.

Importantly, this summit emphasizes not only evidence and technique, but also collaboration. Through focused sessions, panel discussions, and case-based learning, we aim to unify our understanding, identify key knowledge gaps, and develop a roadmap for future research. The inclusion of special topics, ranging from PeVD in men to multidisciplinary program development and outcome measures in PeVD, underscores our commitment to advancing the field in a comprehensive and inclusive manner.

Ultimately, our goal is to improve recognition, refine treatment strategies, and enhance outcomes for patients suffering from this often-overlooked condition. We are grateful for your participation and engagement in what we hope will be a defining moment for the field.
